Forty-eight quarts of liquor and 10 gallons of alcohol were confiscated when an automobile owned by John Landerman of Brookline, Mass., was searched in a Lakeport garage by Federal Prohibition Officer Frank Bailey and Officers John Lyman and Walter Tate, of the Laconia police department.

When arraigned before Judge Frederick W. Fowler in municipal court last Saturday morning, Landerman pleaded guilty to charges of illegal possession and transportation of liquor and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 and costs of \$13.38, and to serve on each count 30 days in the house of correction. Upon payment of costs, the house of correction sentence was placed on file.
