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Liquor Raid in Belmont.

As the result of a visit made to his home by a party of officers headed by Ralph Caswell, of the State Enforcement office, Wilmer Dalton of Belmont, pleading guilty in the Laconia municipal court before Judge F. W. Fowler, to the charge of illegal possession of liquor, and he was sentenced to pay a fine of \$50 and costs of \$9.60 and to serve 30 days in jail; on payment of the fine and costs mitimus not to issue until called for by County Solicitor Thomas P. Cheney, who conducted the case for the state. At the Dalton home the officers found about 20 gallons of liquor and fifty empty bottles. The home of Ledger Parent in Belmont was also raided by the party, and according to the officers they were seen coming by Parent, who locked the door and dumped the stuff into the sink. The officers forced their way into the house and it is alleged discovered a tumbler full of liquor which they claim Parent in his haste had left there. The liquor has been sent to Concord where it is to be analyzed.
