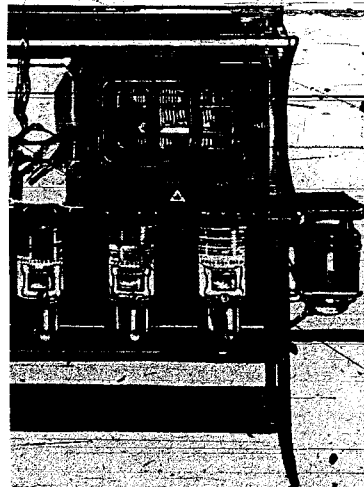

GUNMEN FLOCK TO GERMANY

Recent Liquor Raids in Laconia.

A busy evening was passed by Police Sergt. Buzzell, and Officers Foster and Clare on Thursday night when they conducted a number of liquor raids and gathered in some 20 gallons of mash and two stills. The visits in various sections of the city, caused three respondents to face Judge F. W. Fowler in the Municipal Court Friday morning.

Joseph Salonski, who lives at 91 Water street, was before Judge Fowler, charged with illegal possession of intoxicating liquor. He pleaded not guilty, but was found guilty by the court, who sentenced him to pay a fine of \$25 and costs of \$8.30 and to serve 30 days in the house of correction. On payment of the fine the rest of the sentence was suspended, the mittimus to issue at the call of the city marshal or the county solicitor. Atty. F. E. Normandin appeared for the respondent, and County Solicitor Thomas P. Cheney conducted the case for the state. Officers who made the raid claim to have confiscated two gallons of cider at Salonski's house.

John Gobroski, who resides at 103 Water street, and Harry Christoff, who lives at 8 Canal court, were both before Judge Fowler charged with illegal manufacture of intoxicating liquor. Both pleaded guilty and were sentenced to pay a fine of \$50 and costs of \$8.30 and to serve 30 days in the house of correction. On payment of the fine and costs the jail sentence was suspended, the mittimus to issue at the call of either the city marshal or the county solicitor. Neither had a counsel and County Solicitor Thomas P. Cheney conducted both cases for the state.

At Gobroski's house 20 gallons of mash and a boiler used as a still were found by the raiding officers. At Christoff's house the officers found eight gallons of mash, two bags of raisins and a part of a still.
