BELKNAP COLLEGE INAUGURATES
FIRST PRESIDENT

An eight century old tradition was performed here Saturday, May 2nd, as over 300 friends, guests, and associates saw Dr. Royal M. Frye inaugurated as First

President of Belknap College. Fifty-two other colleges were represented in the academic procession.

The inaugural address was given by John S. Woodbridge, Comptroller for Pam American World Airways. Mr. Bert Dittus, Vice President of Belknap College, was the presiding officer. Honoring Dr. Frye were Dr. William E. Park, President of Simmons College, who offered greetings from the other Colleges and Universities. Dr. Virginia M. Brigham, Vice President for Academic Affairs at Belknap College spoke in behalf of the faculty. Mr. William Kuch represented the Student Council in a speech honoring Dr. Frye. He also presented Dr. Frye with a plaque, on behalf of the Student Body of the College, with the following inscription:

"The Students of Belknap College proudly present this plaque as a small token of their appreciation to Dr. Royal M. Frye, founder and first president of their College, for his increasing devotion to the advancement of higher education".

"Inauguration Day
May 2, 1964"

Mr. Stewart Lamprey, Speaker of the House of Representatives, spoke in behalf of the Governor and the State of New Hampshire.

After the ceremonies a luncheon was served under a tent on the campus. Dr. Frye was presented with gifts from his friends and associates, and tours of the campus were made by the visitors.

CUT SYSTEM

The faculty, at its meeting May 6, 1964, voted to implement the Student Council's recommendation for a cut system as follows:

1. In view of the fact that we are dealing with a part of the term, the student is allowed 2 less cuts in a course than the number of credit hours in that course.
2. All students on the Dean's First and Second lists for the Winter Term are exempt from this cut system.
3. If a student misses 1 more class than the allowance he/she will receive a warning from the Dean of Men/Dean of Women. For each cut beyond this, the student's letter grade in that course will automatically drop one letter.

This cut system has been set up on a trail basis and will apply for the remainder of the present Spring Quarter. At the end of the term, the results of the system are going to be evaluated, and its advantages considered. Provisions will be made then, to adopt and/or improve it for next year.

EDITORIAL

The hot, dry weather is here, and the Lakes Region must again anticipate the danger of forest fires. These fires are almost impossible to prevent; only the brave and constant work of the local fire departments has averted disasters similar to those which occurred in California last year.

The students of Belknap College realize the necessity for an adequate fire control system, and have volunteered to form a fire crew prepared to be "on alert" 24 hours a day.

A student fire crew, properly trained, could be of invaluable help to the fire department of Center Harbor. The Belknap crew would operate from the College campus and the students have suggested the possibility of having a fire truck stationed at the College. The advantages of such an arrangement are obvious. Unlike most volunteer fire fighters who must be called from their jobs, the student crew

members would be easily organized. They could be at the emergency in a matter of precious minutes, doing the preliminary work until town fire crews arrived.

We believe this plan has already been discussed, to some extent, with the Fire Chief of Center Harbor. If he, or anyone, wishes to further examine the Belknap Fire-Crew Plan, we ask that he please contact Mr. Joe Macozek at the College. Formal organization and training should start now.
